


CONCLUSIONS FROM BREAKOUT GROUP

OUTCOME 3 | People living in Thailand, especially those at risk of being left furthest behind, are able to participate in and benefit from development, free from all forms of discrimination



Background

- Critical outcome if we want collectively achieve the SDGs
- Supports the implementation of the two other outcomes
- Closely aligned to the RTG priorities
 - 13th NESDP Support RTG Priorities 3 and 4 and milestones 7, 8 and 9
 - RTG SDG implementation plan
- Investing in **human SDGs** is key if we want to accelerate the required transformation process
- Focus on achieving 2 objectives: address inequalities and strengthen good governance/rule of law

Who are the most left behind?

- Top Answers: Urban poor, migrants, PWDs, refugees
- Other key groups highlighted during the discussion: Youth, elderly groups,
 LGBTI, ethnic minorities
- 2 cross-cutting themes highlighted both by line ministries and UN partners during the discussion:
 - Localisation (engage provincial and municipal level to accelerate achievement of SDGs).
 - Remove barriers to inclusion and development
 - Digital gap (MFA, UNICEF: technologies & education and to reduce inequalities as a whole)
 - **Stigmatisation and discrimination** (e.g. MoPH discrimination against HIV positive groups who are denied access to job and LGBTI groups and challenges they face in the workplace)

What added values does the UN bring to Thailand?

- International standards: e.g. international labour convention mentioned by Court of Justice noting issues around child labour and human trafficking.
- Technical expertise/Collaboration: e.g. Data: National Statistics Office: UN expertise to develop a long-term plan to collect data
- **Best practices:** NESDC asked UN to bring theory into practice with local communities when it comes to localization.
- Innovation: e.g. innovative partnership (public/private) leverage some of innovative solutions to bridge the digital gap

Who are the key stakeholders that can accelerate the achievements of SDGs in Thailand?

- Whole of society approach required to achieve SDGs
- Mentie answers Government, private sector, civil society, local authorities, women leaders, PWDs, youth, media, elderly
- Additional groups highlighted during discussion:
 - **Volunteers**: powerful mechanism to achieve SDG Key actors to identify and refer most vulnerable groups to gov counterparts and UN partners
 - Public/private partnership featured prominently during discussion (smart cities project led by UNHABITAT, UNICEF: nutrition and healthy food marketing and labelling)
